Natural Disasters

Japan has many types of natural disasters: earthquakes, tsunamis, typhoons, and heavy rain. When a disaster hits, we have to protect ourselves.

When an earthquake occurs:

You have to protect your head first. These actions can save lives

Drop Cover Hold On

When typhoons, heavy rain, or tsunamis occur:

In some cases, you don't have to evacuate. Sometimes, you have to stay home. It depends on your situation and location. Keep checking for information. Evacuate early if necessary.

On a website:

The Life of a Guide Dog

Future guide dogs live with a volunteer family; puppy walkers. They spend the first ten months of their lives with puppy walkers. As puppies, they need to learn to be comfortable with people. They also learn basic social rules because it's essential for guide dogs.

When the dogs are one year old, they go to a training center. They train for about a year. They have to pass some tests before they can work as guide dogs.

After eight years, they retire. They will spend their remaining years with another volunteer family.
